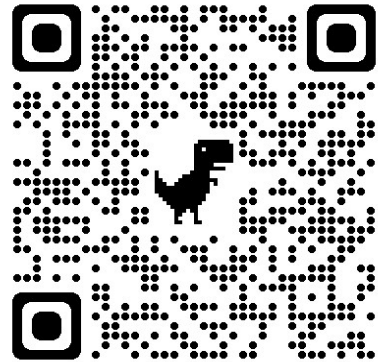

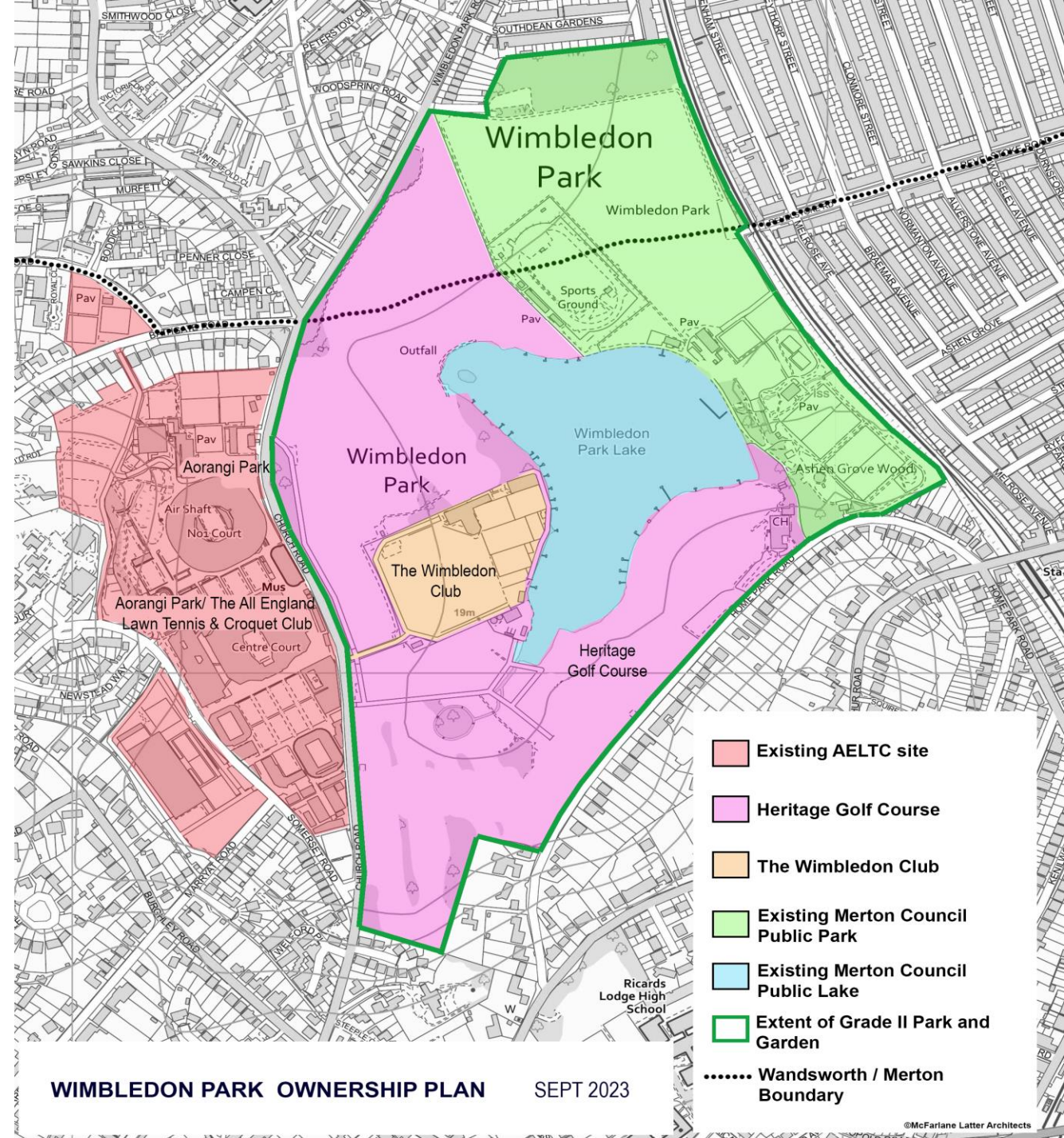

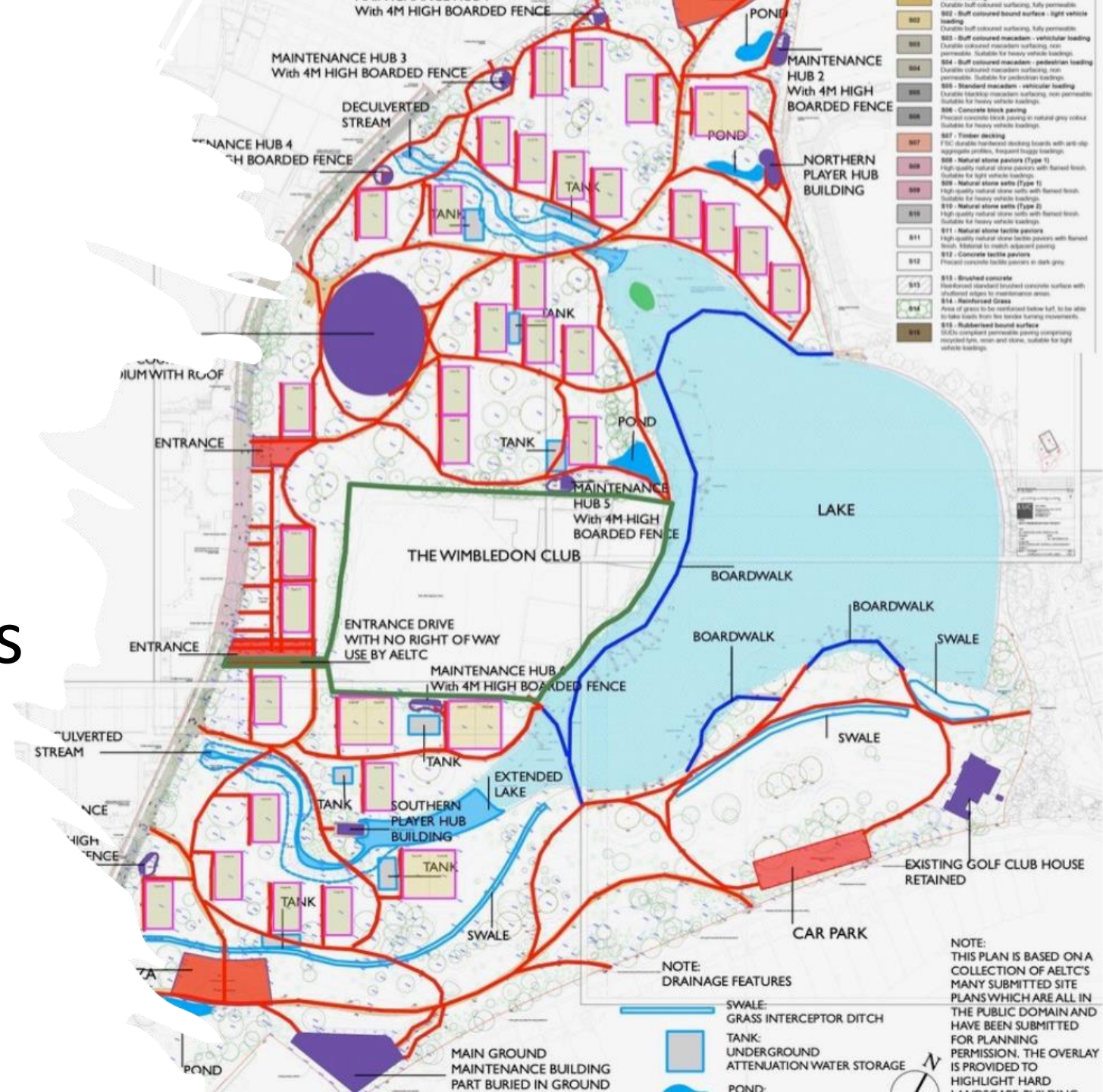


Existing AELTC site & Heritage Wimbledon Park

Proposed works

- **Removal of grassland and topsoil** - cutting 100,000m³ of earth, filling over 45,000m³ and removing 54,000m³
- **Felling of between 296 and 1300 trees** - about 40%, but no precise number due to lack of documentation
- **Extensive clearance of hedgerows and scrub**
- **Pouring 10s of 1000s of tons of concrete** (almost 4000 tons just for the concrete rings underneath 38 grass tennis courts)
- **Desilting the lake, severely polluting it and replacing two priority habitats** (eutrophic water and wet woodland) with reedbeds

Planning application: progress?

Three attempts, 186 documents

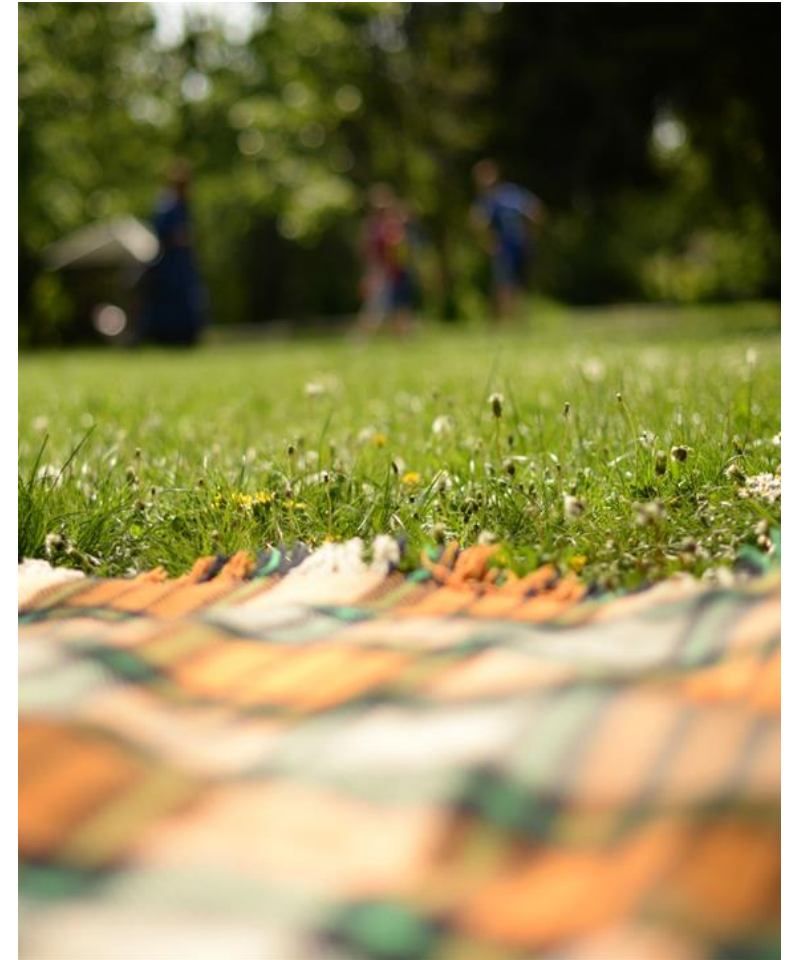
1993 Covenants: Leisure, recreation, open space

Tony Colman, Merton Council Leader:

“Respecting the wishes of local people, this council is resolute that the land will be retained as open space. All England has bought knowing this is our policy, and we would not allow development of the site.”

John Currie, All England chairman:

“We completely understand and support everyone’s determination to keep the land open and we purchased the land on that basis.”



Wimbledon Park Estate: Public Trust Land

1898 Golf course saved it from development

1915 Wimbledon Corporation bought it for open space and as municipal golf course

1965 Merton Council was established, and entire Estate declared to be Public Trust Land

1993 Sold to AELTC as open space

2023 Supreme Court in Day v Shropshire:

“ ... the land is subject to a statutory trust for the public, and members of the public have a right to go onto the land for the purpose of recreation.”
